

BARRAMUNDI FISHING IN OSCEOLA

TIPS FOR TBFFC – No. 13

Tips from a Trio of Experienced Club Members

Walt Durkin Suggests:

Suggest you try the Scientific Angler's clear sinking tip line on one of your saltwater rods. The 12 foot clear tip is stealthy and also casts very well because it is a little more weight forward. Plus, this tip will get your flies down a little faster and deeper, which is an advantage. You can also fish it with poppers, which will stay on top for the first part of the cast until pulled under a little by the sink tip. This action can also induce strikes. So, when buying a new line, consider trying the clear sink tip as an effective substitute for a floating line.

Buy or make one of those fish hook removers, which pulls the fly loose without your having to touch the fish. Especially good for delicate trout, fish with teeth, ladyfish and any other fish you don't wish to handle. //WALT

A Tip from Dave Chouinard:

****Always clean your fly line before and after every use.****

Cleaning your fly line before & after every use is very important. The clean and slick fly line prevents tangles and requires less energy to cast and shoot line. The last thing a fly caster needs is to develop bad casting techniques and tempo due to a stick fly line that simply won't shoot! For skiff and saltwater sight casters, it is important to clean your line even throughout the course of the day. On tarpon trips, I will make a cast and then clean the fly line on the way back into the boat so that no saltwater was on the fly line. This guarantees no tangles after waiting a long time to cast to a fish. The Glide cleaning box is super convenient to have in your pocket or vest...ready to use any moment. Cleaning your line also extends the life of the fly line considerably. Good fishing!

T.B.F.F.C. Potato Salad, By Nick Colantonio:

Ingredients


3 lbs. red potatoes
 Red onion
 4-5 stalks of celery
 2 handfuls of fresh parsley -- chopped fine
 Olive oil
 Wine vinegar
 Salt and pepper

Cut the potatoes into small pieces, boil, drain and then allow to cool.

Add parsley and diced red onion and celery.

Add oil and vinegar, salt and pepper to taste.

You can prepare this salad the night before an outing. Just lightly coat the mixed veggies with oil, tossing well, and store in a closed container. This will keep the salad from getting mushy. The next day, when ready to serve, add the vinegar and salt and pepper. 🍴

“Finally I can sleep at night. After screwing up the last 7, I finally got my fish. The fish was screaming and I had to cast quick she saw it and ate the fly with her head almost completely out of water then went straight under the boat and took about 250 of my 300 yards of backing ‘cause Randy couldn’t start the boat. Once we got on her she jumped 3 more times and we landed her after about 20-25 minutes. Not a nick in the leader and the fly just fell out. This is what I have dreamed of for the last two years. “

Flies and Snook Under the Lights

As long as the water temperature remains above seventy degrees, it is now 84 where I fish; dock snook will readily take a well presented fly. Docks close to the passes are loading up with transition fish. The Tampa bay has a good snook population and the recent changes in regulations will only make large snook more available. Good fly rodding for linesiders is best when you can find a concentration of fish. Lights and their attraction for plankton, which in turn attracts bait fish, is a dinner bell for lazy predators. "Matching the hatch," has been most productive for me. The size of the fish they are pursuing is easy to determine by watching the frantic bait scatter when Mr. Snook makes his run. Select a fly that closely duplicates his forage and success is guaranteed.



Most of my fishing is from a Hewes Redfisher, equipped with a bow mounted Minn Kota. Not using an anchor, allows me to maneuver the boat away from the dock and structure quickly after setting the hook. Two experienced fly fisherman can fish at the same time and help one another when one is hooked. This is not a problem with small fish, but in the area I fish most fish are over 24 inches and every outing results in a few broken leaders as Hawgs head for the pilings.

Tackle requirements will vary with the size fish that will be encountered. A few years ago I spent a week in Naples and fished dock lights every night. I caught very few fish over 23-24 inches and used a 9 foot, 7 weight, with a floating weight forward line, most of the time. A 9 foot leader with a 20 pound shocker was more than adequate. Here I use a 9 or 10 weight, one with a floating and one with a sink tip weight forward line. 30 to 40 pound fluorocarbon shock tippetts are used. If you want to use regular mono, I suggest Mason because of its stiffness and abrasive resistance. The extra investment in fluorocarbon for a shock tippet is well worth it.

Check the tide charts and pick a night or early morning when you have maximum tidal flow. This is very important! If you don't have moving water, they will not be active. If a fast flow is just beginning, a feeding frenzy could be your reward. As you

approach a dock, if you see fish actively chasing bait, you know you're going to have a bonanza.



Fly patterns that match the bait they are chasing will get results. I've thrown larger flies that look irresistible, but are refused. Ninety percent of the time a minnow imitation is used, occasionally a small shrimp pattern is preferred. The fly that was a hot item the last time out will not work tonight. Accurate casting is needed; a sloppy presentation will spook fish. If one or two snook are caught under one light, even though there are other fish present, a move to another area to let the fish settle will get them feeding again. I often fish an area where enough lights are present that only my electric is needed to move around. When using the electric, a constant, slow steady speed will not spook fish like frequent starting and stopping.

Night fishing makes normal function more difficult. Get very familiar with everything in your boat. Organize your fishing so that you can find what is needed without fumbling around and making noise. Remember, you are usually in someone's backyard. If there's a big noisy dog in the neighborhood, he'll be out on the dock letting everyone know you're there. Decorating a dock with flies and leaders is not the way to get an invitation back. Be courtesy and quiet! If someone is on a lighted dock, I use my electric to get close and let them know how much I appreciate being able to fish there. You will be surprised at their reaction, and will often get more good information. Recently a dock owner said to me, "you should try Ted's dock over there, he has a lot of structure in front of his place."

Night fishing for snook around lighted docks is one of my favorite fly fishing pursuits. Give it a try, and see what you've been missing. The first time a big, mean snook grabs your fly and heads for the barnacles you will begin to adjust you're your sleeping pattern to allow more time for unbelievable excitement.



FLY OF THE MONTH

Jim Stewart Bluegill Fly

As Tied by Robert Fischer



This is a simple but highly effective fly for bream, and sometimes bass.

MATERIALS:

Hook- Tiemco #10, 1x long, straight eye

Body- small black chenille, and very thin purple hackle

Tail- small white rubber Silli Legs and red pearl Krystal Flash

Head- small or medium bead chain

Thread- red flat waxed

TYING INSTRUCTIONS:

1. Place hook in vise. Tie in 3 or 4 strands of white rubber at the bend of the hook so that the rubber bends slightly down. Strands should be approx. 3/4 length of the hook.
2. Tie in 8 to 10 strands of Krystal Flash at the tail that stick out straight back from the hook shank. The flash should be the same length as the hook shank.
3. Tie in one thin purple hackle by the tip and tie in the end of the chenille at the beginning of bend of the hook.
4. Wrap thread 80% of the way toward the hook eye. Tie in bead chain eye. Hold thread out of the way to permit building the body.
5. Apply glue to the tie in point of the chenille and hackle, run a small bead of glue along the hook shank to the bead chain, glue in the bead chain. Wrap the chenille toward the bead chain and tie in behind the bead chain (on the side away from the hook eye). Palmer the hackle on top of the chenille toward the bead chain and tie in behind the bead chain.
6. Build up a red head with the thread between the bead chain and the hook eye. Whip finish.

Fishing Report and Forecast

“What a great time to go fishing!”

The big deal this time of year is the Tarpon bite. Fishing with **Capt. Rick Grasset, Hal Lutz** from Parrish Fl had a lot of shots at Tarpon, a couple of bites and one in the air with a black and chartreuse deceiver.

Member **Greg Peterson** finally can sleep at night. He did get tarpon he was looking for, no weight was reported but the fish took out 250 of the 300 yards of backing and took 20 to 24 minutes to bring along side the boat. Congratulations Greg.

Sunday morning June 7th **Neil Sperling** went to East Beach on Ft. DeSoto and caught several trout to 18” and a lady fish. He said the weather was great and so was the fishing.

Capt Bryon Chamberlin reports lots of fish (mainly snook) around the dock lights in St Pete area. Fish peak tide movement for best action. Tons of trout are on the deeper grass flats around Fort Desoto. Fish chartreuse & white clouser in mixed sand and grassy areas in 3 to 5 feet of water. Tarpon are hot just off the gulf beaches. Black and purple or chartreuse and yellow toad flies have been the ticket. Fish to 140 lbs have been hooked so far in June.

Rick and Nanette O’Hara reported that an evening of fishing the lites they saw many snook but could not get them to bite but they were able to catch several sea trout in the 15” range.

Our June outing at John Millns’ was a lot of fun. Fourteen members were at the outing and several bass and blue gills were caught. **Nanette O’hara** I think caught her first bass and you should have heard her yell. She was so excited she asked her husband Rick if she could come back soon to do this kind of fishing. A picnic lunch was served with hot dogs and Italian potato salad prepared by **Nick Colantonio** and **Bob Gaulin**. Thanks Dr. John for making your camp ground available to us.
