CDC Notice Regarding Meeting Places

In order to protect the health of TBFFC members all attendees must self-screen for symptoms or other risk factors of COVID-19 before attending monthly meetings.

Your answer must be no to the following questions before attending:

- Have you experienced any of the following symptoms in the past 48 hours: fever or chills, cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, fatigue, muscle or body aches, headache, new loss of taste or smell, sore throat, congestion or runny nose, nausea or vomiting, diarrhea?
- Have you been in close physical contact in the last 14 days with anyone who is known to have laboratory-confirmed COVID-19 OR anyone who has any symptoms consistent with COVID-19?
- Are you isolating or quarantining because you may have been exposed to a person with COVID-19 or are worried that you may be sick with COVID-19?
- Are you currently waiting on the results of a COVID-19 test?
- Have you traveled in the past 10 days?

I can count on one hand the rivers I've fished with this many quality fish ranging from 18 to 21 inches. And they weren't the big ones. Due to excess weeds in September, the Miracle Mile was fishing slow with an occasional 25 inch'er plus being caught. 

New club member **Bryan Koesler** has had good results with the seaducer patterns pictured. This simple pattern is easy to tie, cast and fish. Add a mono weed guard and you are good to go in all conditions.

According to the Salt Water Sportsman this versatile fly pattern was first used in salt water by Homer Rhodes in the 1940s, when he commercially fish for snook with his fly rod. The Homer Rhodes' Streamer became the Seaducer (a much sexier name)in the 1980s, when it was renamed by a popular fly-fishing writer.

Fishing Report and Forecast "What a great time to go fishing!"

Kayak guide Neil Taylor reports: The schedule has been busy for the first time since the virus stuff started. The action has been easy. It is just plain easy to be a guide when the action is like this. On the fly, very good. My flies used by the fly clients, my flies caught a little of everything. My flies are pretty straight-forward. A weight on the eye of the hook and a lot of gold tied in. Chartreuse or white mixed into most of the flies. Pompano, mackerel, trout, ladyfish, jacks and even a big sheepshead. Ladyfish and trout are easiest. The incoming tides in the mornings, just easy to find and stay on the action. Slower strips are sometimes necessary but not always. I hope things continue like this for a long time. Contact Neil at Livelybaits@aol.com Phone: 727-692-6345.


Captain Pat Damico reports: Now is a great opportunity for a much sought-after fly rod slam. Fishing lighted areas at night, especially with this week's strong tides, will be a blast. Hungry predators will be feeding very actively where food is plentiful and easy to catch. Redfish, trout and snook will lazily inhale baitfish as the tide sweeps them into gaping mouths. Fish lighted docks and bridge fenders that are familiar during the day so that you can plan your obstacle-free approach. A bow-mounted electric motor is preferred rather than anchoring because larger fish can be turned away from the barnacle-encrusted structure that ruins fly lines and leaders. Keep your fly rod tip close to the water and avoid high sticking which can break long rods. Rig two 8- or 9-weight rods, one with a floating line and the second with a clear sinking tip. 25-pound fluorocarbon tippets and loop knots tied to size 2-4 white baitfish imitations will produce, especially when cast up tide of the fish which will be oriented facing their incoming meal. Match available baitfish size. Strip setting when the fish is felt rather than raising the rod tip to set the hook will ensure a high rate of success. Capt Rick Grassett reports: Fishing deep grass flats of Sarasota Bay is a good choice for action with a variety of species including trout, pompano, blues and Spanish mackerel. Check the coastal gulf for Spanish mackerel, false albacore and tripletail when conditions are good. Shallow water fishing for reds and large trout is also a good option now, although they are very challenging in clear water. These conditions usually require long casts to avoid spooking fish. Our natural resources are under constant pressure from red tides fueled by industrial, agricultural and residential runoff, freezes, increasing fishing pressure and habitat loss and degradation, please limit your kill, don't kill your limit!

Tarpon will become more plentiful as resident fish make their way out of rivers and creeks and early arriving migratory fish begin to show along beaches, particularly by the end of the month. Water temperature in the gulf is a key factor with 80 degrees being an optimum temperature. As the water warms towards that, fish will become more plentiful. Resident fish may be rolling on deep grass flats in some of the same places that you find trout, laid up on edges of shallow grass flats or along sand bars. Fly anglers might connect with a black Deceiver or Tarpon bunny fly fished on a 12-weight fly rod with a floating or clear sink tip fly line depending on depth. 



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
