
Carl Hanson outing is 17 October at Ft Desoto sponsored by the Suncoast Club.

Experts and beginners alike are invited to test their fly casting skills at the Tampa Bay Fly Fishing Club's annual "Big Gun Shoot-Out" casting competition!

Individuals and teams of 3 are welcome!

Plaques will be awarded for highest scoring individual, highest scoring teams, and the "Big Gun," the overall distance casting champion.

Contestants will participate in competition stations that mimic the challenges of fly fishing, such as casting under the mangroves, into a cup of water, or through a hoop suspended a few feet off the ground. Come out and give it a try – you'll be hooked!

The competition will run from 9 am - 12 pm. There is NO entry fee, and lunch will be provided to all contestants. You may use your own rod for all competition stations including the Big Gun distance contest. The long cast final for the Big Gun must be an 8 weight with a standard fly line. Volunteers also are needed to help set up the course and score contestants.

Hook: Gamakatsu SL11-3h, size 4

Thread: clear mono

Eyes: medium bead chain

Beads: medium strung bead chain in white, pearl or black from craft store

Flash: two strands or orange crystal flash

Tail: orange rabbit tied in at the bend

Braid: single strand of pearl braid tied on

the bottom

Body wrap: pearl Flashaboo

Finish coat: UV finish

Fly of the Month: Hula Shrimp

Terry Baird featured this fly in the Sep/Oct edition of Tail magazine. It's a small, shiny jig-type fly that could imitate a minnow or shrimp. It's easy and fun to tie with several variations. I have caught trout and mackerel on it and want to try it on redfish, snook and bone fish. Pompano should also love it with a bright tail.

The strung beads make a cool, segmented body tied in behind bead chain or lead eyes. The finished body consists of the beads, a flashaboo wrap and pearl braid on the bottom.

Tie the beads in loosely to keep them on each side of the hook. Once you add the other materials and the UV, everything will be solid. With this basic body you and add various tails and/or wings. The materials on the left make a shrimp version.

You can use different colors for the beads, body and tail. You can also add feathers on top or bunny as shown below. Look it up on YouTube for detailed tying instructions.



Tenkara Fly Fishing


I mentioned taking up Tenkara fly fishing in last month's newsletter and received questions on the technique from several club members. Here is a little bit about what I know and may help get you started.

Tenkara is the simple Japanese method of fly-fishing, which uses only a rod, line and fly. Tenkara fly fishing is a minimalist type of fly fishing designed for mountain stream trout fishing. All you need for a day's fishing is your rod, line, extra tippet and a few flies. Many Tenkara fishers use only one or t wo patterns to keep things simple. A soft hackle wet fly like the partridge and orange is traditional, but you can fish any of your favorites, wet or dry.

A fixed length of line connects to the tip of the telescopic rod. Tenkara rods are ultra-portable, telescoping down to as little as 15 inches, but extending out to over 10 ft long. Casting the fly to where you think the fish are is very quick to learn and intuitive. You simply flip the fly out with your 12 ft rod, 12 foot line and 5 ft tippet. Work the fly as you normally would with a dead drift or imparting action. When the trout strikes, simply raise the rod and play the fish using the long flexible rod. Bring the fish gently to hand by grasping the line and finally the tippet.

If you enjoy fishing mountain streams, you'll enjoy the presentations provided by Tenkara, where you can cast on the other side of multiple currents for a clean fly presentation where no line gets dragged by the currents. Precise presentations with the long rod are a big advantage to Tenkara. Additionally, stealth is the name of the game, thus stay out of the water, wear sky or earth-toned clothing and don't let the fish see you when you're stalking them.

While not really practical for salt water you can fish our local ponds and canals just fine with your Tenkara. Just tie on you favorite fly and go for it. Sponge spiders or small streamers will be good choices. Look on the internet and YouTube for more information on this fun way to fly fish. I know, just what we need; another excuse to buy one more fly rod! //Walt

Fishing Report and Forecast

"What a great time to go fishing!"

Kayak guide Neil Taylor reports: No question, for the end of summer, this is the best action I have ever seen. It has just been magnificent and sunrise is the way to go. Afternoon attempts do not work as well. In a word: Easy. Getting on action has been nothing and I think the species closures have worked. It has translated to excellent opportunities with trout, easily the best target. But there are all kinds of options. Time will continue to heal this fishery, but it is very good these days. The Neil Fly has connected good. It has a weighted head and a mixture of white and gold. An easy tie, my clients who use it have enjoyed great results. The variety has been good. We have caught huge bluefish, many snapper. Additionally, we have jumped tarpon are catching redfish and snook. Ladyfish and jacks crash the party some days while, not what I am after, they do provide action. With October's arrival, even better opportunities are dead ahead. Capt. Pat Damico: "We used to practice on Tampa Bay redfish to catch bonefish in the Keys, now we practice on bonefish in the Keys to catch Tampa Bay redfish." That's a quote by Lefty Kreh, a well-respected fly fisherman. Fishing and boating pressure has changed our local fish behavior. Schools of reds are starting to feed heavily in the shallow water of our bay and surrounding areas in preparation for an upcoming spawn. Guides who fish with bait are reporting many successful outings. Are those of us who prefer fly fishing at a disadvantage? Fly fishing for reds in shallow water is more like hunting. Be very stealthy, cautious, wear clothes that blend in with the environment, and be able to make long accurate casts with a minimum of false casting. If in a boat or kayak, leave the watercraft and wade slowly enough not to cause a ripple. Carefully place a good imitation of a baitfish, shrimp or crab close to the nose of a wary red. If fish are moving, lead them as you would when wing shooting. The cast will be where the fish will be soon after it lands. When pursuing tailing or slow-moving sighted fish, drop the offering close to the fish's nose without pulling it into his face. Smaller flies, size 2-4, and long fine leaders are necessary. Everyone wants to know what fly pattern will work. Presentation is always more important than a specific pattern. When using a baitfish, shrimp or crab fly, work it like what you are trying to imitate. Capt. Rick Grassett reports: Fishing should turn on this month. Schools of reds will begin to break up and scatter on shallow flats. There should also be good action with snook and big trout in shallow water. Snook will gorge themselves at night around lighted docks in the ICW. There should also be good action in the coastal gulf with Spanish mackerel, false albacore (little tunny), tripletail and cobia. You might also still find tarpon anywhere from upper Charlotte Harbor and Tampa Bay to along the beaches. Snook, reds and spotted seatrout remain closed to harvest on the west coast of Florida. The Florida FWC has extended a temporary modification of regulations for reds, snook and trout, in the areas affected by the recent red tide. The area extends from Pasco County, south to the south bank of Gordon Pass in Collier County. Reds, snook and trout are catch and release only in that zone until May 31, 2021.
