Dick Miekka and I fished the famous Miramachi River in New Brunswick for a week in September. We had a great time; see page 8 for pictures.






TBFFC NEWS & NOTES

Fishing Report and Forecast "What a great time to go fishing!"

Kayak guide Neil Taylor reports: An extended slow season, less time fishing than usual which is too bad. There's a good Fall bite before Fall has arrived. One or two serious cold fronts and the action with bigger trout will accelerate. Trout will lead the way for the next six months. "Closed" to harvest, their numbers should be good, although not everyone got the memo that they are closed. The baitfish hasn't left so chasing the baitfish schools is still a legit way to go. It is still good to go early but we get some cold weather, the bite will extend farther into the day. Season opportunities exist already. Pompano winding down, silver trout accelerating. Mackerel are out there good right now: Much better for King mackerel than spanish mackerel. You need to get out into the Gulf for this to be a realistic opportunity.

Beautiful sunny windless days may be great for a lot of things but fly fishing isn't one of them unless you make some adjustments. Very clear water, especially in the gulf, has presented many issues when sight casting. Snook are still around and share their water close to shore with baby tarpon. If we can easily see fish at a distance, how do we appear to them? Not using a flats boat is a good start. Use your boat to get to fish that are undisturbed, then wade if the bottom is suitable. It is even better to stay on land away from the water when fish are close to shore. Avoid a shadow or flash from the sun on your equipment. Leave brightly colored clothes at home. Blend in with the water or sky. Minimize what you carry. Metal fly boxes, hemostats, clippers, reflective sunglasses, even light-colored skin can be covered to allow a closer approach as well as sun protection. Wear a neutral-colored wide brim hat with a dark underside to improve vision with good polarized sunglasses. A good pair of fly fishing gloves should also have a thicker area to prevent cut fingers from frequent stripping of the fly line while working a fly. The new distance fly lines that have a rough texture cut skin easily. Long thinner tapered leaders, often 12-15 feet, will keep the thicker fly line away from the fish. Cast accurately and allow the smaller fly to land on the water softly, well ahead of a moving fish. Very long casts are necessary; practice them with an absolute minimum of false casting.

Capt. Rick Grassett reports: Fishing dock lights for snook and more before dawn and the flats or coastal gulf after daylight is a good option. With stone crab traps in the water now, there is more structure to attract tripletail in the coastal gulf. Fishing mangrove shorelines for catch and release reds and snook in backcountry areas should also be a good option. You may find juvenile tarpon in creeks, canals or around dock lights this time of year. Our natural resources are under constant pressure from red tides fueled by industrial, agricultural and residential runoff, freezes, increasing fishing pressure and habitat loss and degradation, please limit your kill, don't kill your limit!






