Fly Fishers International joined our many Conservation Partners in April 2021 to form the Hunt & Fish 30x30 Initiative, which essentially is a coalition that is endorsing a goal of preserving 30% of the globe's lands and waters by 2030. Members of the Initiative have been working since on development of comprehensive recommendations for achievement of the "30x30" goal in the United states as an example to other world leaders. Those recommendation have been completed with substantive input from our Conservation Committee and they were both invited and delivered to the Biden Administration yesterday (October 13, 2021) for inclusion of the Administration's "Conserving and Restoring America the Beautiful 2021" and in support of enhanced conservation delivery in the United States. The document is very comprehensive; so, I would encourage you to at least read the Introduction and Executive Summary of the document to appreciate the substance of the recommendations FFI has been a part of developing. Also, please do share information regarding the 30x30 Initiative and these recommendations within your respective Councils and Clubs.

FISHING THE DRIFTLESS by Patty Anderson

We were on a road trip to visit a family cabin in Northern Wisconsin this summer when my Chicago based brother called and suggested we meet up in Minnesota to fly fish for trout. I said "What are you talking about? Trout in Minnesota?" He answered "Yes, you can catch trout in Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois and even Iowa." Iowa??? We immediately set our GPS and routed ourselves toward southeastern Minnesota.

The area my brother was talking about is referred to the Driftless Area of the Upper Midwest, an area that expands 24,000 square miles along the Mississippi River and bordering the 4 states. The ancient glaciers that moved across North America during the ice age left this area untouched. What resulted is a unique topography of rugged limestone cliffs, deep valleys, and most important to anglers is more than 600 natural springs that feed thousands of miles of cold, crystal clear streams. Brook trout are native to these streams. Brown and rainbow trout were introduced in the 1800's and the browns have adapted so well that they spawn naturally in the streams and some have grown to trophy size catches. Fishing the area means traipsing through cow pastures, corn fields, and forested valleys to fish small streams that can hold big fish. Wisconsin and Minnesota have made agreements with many farmers and landowners to allow anglers river access through their private lands.

On our first trip to the area we hired a guide from the Driftless Fly Fishing Company in Preston, Minnesota. We followed him down many dirt roads through pristine farm country and Amish buggies to our guide's secret creek!! This crystal clear stream had 2 miles of continued easy public access along a grassy bank with a well established walking trail. We did not encounter any other fisherman on the river that day and had plenty of room to spread out and many opportunities to sight cast and catch both small and large trout.

We were so impressed by this fishery that we made a stop in Viroqua, Wisconsin for a second trip. We fished on our own and spent the first day driving down farm roads, going up hills and down valleys as we scouted out the many rivers and streams. We fished the next day on the Timber Coulee River, that winds through farmers fields in a beautiful valley. Although there were other anglers in the area, we felt no fishing pressure and had plenty of river for the three of us to spread out and fish. A farmer whose property we were on came out for a friendly chat and gave us some fishing tips. There are many rivers and streams to explore in the Driftless Area and we will be going back. We added catching an Iowa and Illinois trout on our list too. It is definitely worth a trip to the midwest.

Robert Fischer reports: "Mike Perez and I fished around the shallows of Anclote Key and saw several large redfish in skinny water but didn't get them to bite. We also got some hits on top-water plugs from some snook but got no hookups. At the very end of the day (noon) we found a pothole with about 10 snook in it but we let that pass until next time. I also fished Chassahowitzka Reserve with Jim Adams who knows the area very well. It was too early (dawn) and the water was too muddy to sight fish so we threw top-water plugs only. We caught 5 redfish 3 snook and a jack all on Zara Spooks. Great fun. Plus we were back at the ramp by 11 am. The Chaz is a very treacherous place but fortunately Jim has 20 years of experience. I would never take my boat up there. They have the meanest nastiest rocks I have ever seen, and it's rumored that the rocks move around at night so they can grab lower units where it was safe to run on the previous day".





Fishing Report and Forecast "What a great time to go fishing!"

Captain Pat Damico reports: A sign of our approaching fall fishing blitz is the large schools of false albacore, or baby tunny, feeding heavily on maturing baitfish, especially in gulf passes. Either a strong incoming or outgoing tide will have these speedy fish chasing baitfish to the surface in areas that will attract terns and gulls, causing chaos. The birds will tell you where to fish. This is ideal fly-rod fare and can be almost too easy by observing a few rules. Running an outboard into the school will ruin your chances for success, so use the wind and tide to position your boat ahead of the surface activity, letting the fish come to you. An electric motor run slowly is a big help to get a good position. Jacks, ladyfish and mackerel will be mixed in with the albies, taking advantage of the easy pickings. The wild surface activity usually contains smaller fish, so getting your fly deeper will result in larger fish. Use a 9-weight fly rod with a full sinking or sink tip fly line; 4 or 5 feet of 25-pound hard monofilament leader will be attached to a size 2 white baitfish pattern made of synthetic materials rather than natural hair for durability. You can't retrieve the fly too fast. Many anglers put the fly rod under their arm and retrieve using both hands in hand-over-hand fashion after making a long cast; 150 yards of 30-pound backing will give you the advantage when the fish make long runs. A good large arbor reel with smooth adjustable drag is necessary.

Capt Rick Grassett reports:

Look for reds, snook and large trout in shallow water. Fishing deep grass flats of Sarasota Bay is a good choice for action with a variety of species including trout, Spanish mackerel, jacks, blues and more. Our natural resources are under constant pressure from red tides fueled by industrial, agricultural and residential runoff, toxic spills, freezes, increasing fishing pressure and habitat loss and degradation, please limit your kill, don't kill your limit!




