Fly Fishing Tip of the Month


Tracking

"Why does my fly line hook to the left at the end of my casts, instead of laying out straight?" A kindred southpaw will hook right of course.

This one is a recurrent error. I have suffered from the same malaise. But it is also rather easy to cure. For any successful cure though, the diagnosis must be spot on.

Why? This error happens if the tracking isn't straight.

How? On the backcast – the caster doesn't throw the line straight behind, but well to the left of the caster, as you can see in the diagram.



This happens when the caster opens the wrist way too much in the horizontal plane and sends the line in a great big curve back, thus violating the 180-degree rule. On the forward cast even if the line is reasonably straight it will hook to the left.

The cure – pick your target on the backcast. Aim for something (a tree – an island – anything) that is behind you and cast straight back. One way to practice this is to lay out a rope (any line will do) on the ground in the position of the A-B line on your drawing. Deliver some back-casts and see where the line lands. If left off the line they need to adjust. In the picture, A-B is the straight track casting line, so never let your line cross that line. On the forward cast, you don't cross the A-B line, if you do the line will hook left. On the back-cast look of your reel, if the side plates aren't vertical, you are not tracking straight. So, the cure is - to pick your targets and be sure that the rod tip is traveling straight. When you do - voila - the line lays out straight.

If I can only give one piece of advice - here goes — **WATCH YOUR BACKCASTS**. If I go Yogi Berra on you — "You can learn a lot by just watching."

However, there are situations when you want the line to curve at presentation. And you are right – those are the curve casts!"

Spider Fly Bodies from Flipflops by Ted Rich

Are you punching foam spider bodies using a hand held straight walled cartridge case? There might be an easier way to cut bodies for spiders or poppers by modifying the case. Drilling out the FIRED primer and installing a small bolt with lock nut allows it to be placed in a drill or drill press. A $1 \frac{1}{4}$ " round-head stove bolt and a $6-32 \times \frac{1}{8}$ " nylon lock nut were used with 9mm and .45 cases.

The Golden Days of Winter

Some members may have heard me use the term "golden days" and wonder what I am referring to? Golden days for me occur in winter and are those few magical days where everything comes together for a spectacular day of sight fishing. Take note and seek out these days as they can be precious and scarce. For example, several elements must come together to make it happen.

First of all are the low, negative tides on winter mornings. These are easy to predict; just look at the tide tables online for the area of the bay you will fish. You will find two five-day cycles of good low tides each month from November thru February; thus you have 40 potential days. The next important factor is wind and you seek a north or northeast wind. This helps get the tides to their lowest point and the lower the better. Less important, but nice to have are clear sunny skies. Clear skies allow the best conditions for sight fishing.

Here is the hitch. Of the 40 good, low tide days you may have only 10 to 15 that coincide with the north or northeast wind. And, only perhaps half of them will have sunshine. So, we are down to five or, at best, ten golden days a year! These days offer the best sight fishing of the year and I watch and plan for them as carefully as I can. One example occurred on Valentines Day this year when my Valentine sent me out to fish. This was a Monday and the day after the super bowl. I mention that because I was surprised to find the Cypress flat empty of fisherman. I decided to try the south end as the channel at the far end often holds fish on the extra low tides. A north wind of about 10-15 mph blew the water very low. Reds were milling in the channel as I expected, but, they were a little hard to see on the dark bottom and spooky. After I tried them for 30 minutes with no luck, I walked to the north side where the fish are easier to see. Here, under blue skies I found schools of reds happily roaming up and down the flat. I tried a small dark fly I tie with a grizzly hackle, raccoon fur body and orange hot spot and also one of my tan rat flies. I caught eight reds up to 28 inches over four hours, constantly seeing and casting to redfish. This was a golden day for me and I was disappointed no one else showed up to share it with. The flat comfortably fishes as many as eight anglers as you often pick a spot and wait for the fish to come to you.

Of course you can catch fish when the conditions are not golden. You may find reds tailing on calm, foggy mornings. And, you can still see fish on cloudy days, it's just tougher. But, most importantly, don't miss the low tides that coincide with the north/northeast winds. A golden day will offer your best chance to sight fish multiple cruising and tailing redfish. During January and February 2022 I brought about 30 redfish to hand on these good days, all sight fishing. I hope to see you on the flats to share a "Golden Day". //Walt

Smitty's Fried Grouper Sandwich

Ingredients

- 8 (6 oz) grouper fillets
- 2 large eggs
- ½ tsp salt, ¼ tsp cayenne pepper
- 1 cup all-purpose flour, seasoned with salt and pepper to taste
- cornmeal for dredging the fish
- vegetable oil for deep-frying the fish
- 1 red onion, sliced very thin
- leafy butter lettuce
- 2 tomatoes, sliced thin






Beat together eggs, salt and cayenne in a shallow dish. Place flour mixture and cornmeal in separate shallow dishes. Dredge each fillet in flour mixture and dip in egg wash. Dredge fillets in cornmeal last. In a deep fry pan, heat 1" of the oil to 375° F. Fry the fillets in batches for 2 to 4 minutes on each side, or until browned and cooked through. Transfer fillets to paper towels to drain.

Layer the red onion, lettuce, tomatoes, and fillets on the sandwich rolls, accompany with thick cut or waffle fries. Congratulations to new club member **Jerry Kells** on his first redfish at the Cypress flat. Jerry has shown up at Cypress on the low tides and has put in many hours patiently trying for these spooky reds. His efforts finally paid off with this great red. Now we just have to show Jerry how to take a picture that includes his smiling face!

Fishing Report and Forecast "What a great time to go fishing!"

Captain Pat Damico reports: If you can't get out to fly fish because of cold water, high winds, and other winter conditions what is there to do? This is a good time to make sure your equipment is ready for your next outing. If your rod and reel are compatible and in good condition, the next and most important item is your fly line. When I examine a client's equipment, I am often amazed at the condition of their fly lines. Strip the line from the reel and examine the part that you use most. It will be easy to tell because the line left on the reel will look almost new. Using some warm non-detergent liquid soap on a micro towel, run the used line through it folded over in one hand while pulling it through with the other. Do this several times. The dirt on the towel should amaze you. Pull it through a towel with plain water a couple of times and then through a dry paper towel. Inspect the line for damage, if there are major nicks and cracks, a replacement is in order. If the line looks fine, treat it with one of the many liquid line dressings available at your local fly shop, carefully following the manufacturer's instructions. This will restore some of the chemical components and preservatives that make it shoot through the guides and float well. Never store fly lines where the heat and sun will cause irreparable damage. I clean my fly lines after every outing, especially in saltwater. Fly fisherman Pat Damico charters Fly Guy in lower Tampa Bay and can be reached at captpatdamico.com and 727-504-8649.

Capt Rick Grassett reports: Look for reds, snook and larger trout in shallow water. Fishing deep grass flats of Sarasota Bay is a usually a good choice for action with a variety of species including trout, pompano, blues and more. Snook at night around dock lights in the ICW is also a good option depending on conditions. Our natural resources are under constant pressure from red tides fueled by industrial, agricultural and residential runoff, toxic spills and discharges, freezes, increasing fishing pressure and habitat loss and degradation, please limit your kill, don't kill your limit! 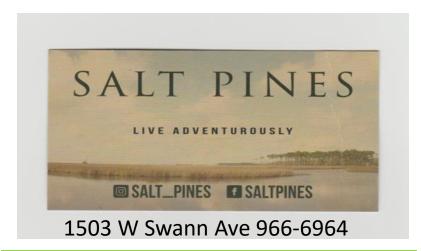


