
#### **PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE**

We welcome your ideas on how to improve our club. Please email me or bring ideas to the meeting.



#### **TBFFC NEWS & NOTES**

Robert Fischer has this fishing tip. "The trout bite is still available in the deeper grass flats around Anclote Key. Work in 4 to 7 feet deep with full sink or sink tip lines to get your flies down just above the grass tips. Clousers in brown and gold as well as chartreuse and gold worked well for me last week. The bite should be improving as the water temperature is starting to drop out of the 90's now." Anclote Key is off Tarpon Springs and you need a boat or kayak to access it.

Please check out our website (TBFFC.org) if you have not done so. Bruce Anderson manages it for us and does a great job. New members should check out our wading guide on the webpage. You will find useful information on wade fishing especially in the winter months. We have some good wade fishing areas that allow you to get out without a boat. The guide online tells all!

# Fly Fishing Tip for August Jonas Magnuson Tip #7

So, now you won some raffle and are going fishing with a guide with a flats boat. Now you must practice the ready position before you go fishing.

The ready position Is the position the angler takes in the bow of a skiff for sight-casting. The angler wants as much line out of the rod as possible to be able to load it quickly to reduce the time to delivery. However, that line can't be so long as to interfere with the push pole placement or the trolling motor.

The ready position in essence:

- The length of the fly line outside the tiptop needs to be enough to load the rod quickly, but not so much that it gets into the motor or poling staff or under the boat if dragged boat side. The iron rule is if it can snag it will.
- The fly must be controlled by holding it by the bend of the hook (or by the leader just proximal to it).
- The line must be controlled by the line hand.

Any method that satisfies these 3 points will work. The fly can of course be held by either hand. The one that works best for me is :

- about 15' of the line outside tiptop
- holding the fly by hook bend in rod hand (thumb index)
- line hand holds line 2' from the stripping guide

When a cast is possible, I sweep the rod away from the fish and let go of the fly. For casts with fish inside 35,' I have enough to get there without slipping or shooting line. Then if more line needs to be aerialized I can make one forward and one back cast slipping both ways and then shoot more line.

Which method you choose to use is not the most important decision. The most important decision is to choose a method that complies with 1-3 and then stick to it.

# **Trout Fishing Tip**

Here is a good tip to help organize your trout flies and leaders. We often fish a dry fly with a dropper about 12 to 24 inches below. A big dry like a Stimulator or Hopper works well with a small bead head nymph. When you want to change set-ups to say, just a big nymph, then you may want to keep your dry/dropper intact. The Tenkara spools pictured on the right work well for this. These spools are made to hold a Tenkara line, leader and fly by wrapping them around the soft spool and then sticking the fly in. You can do the same with your dry/dropper rig, to safely store it until you want to tie it back on. This saves cutting the dropper off and wasting time and tippet.

You can also pre-tie several dropper rigs, so they are ready to go on the water. A wooly bugger with a small nymph is also a good rig you can pre-tie. This saves you from working with light tippets and knots while on the river in poor light. And, when one rig gets all tangled as they often do, you are prepared for a quick change. The Tenkara spools are available on-line (Amazon has them) and you can get 10 for about a dollar each. Each spool can hold two rigs at a time. Check it out!

### Wisconsin Summer Adventure

Bruce and Patty Anderson invited four of us to spend a week in the north woods of Wisconsin in their family cabin. Located in Manitowish Waters, the cabin has direct access to a chain of lakes. Bruce also has two boats on the lake so we were set for a fishing adventure.

The lakes have beautiful, clear water and good structure including grass, rocks, logs and many small islands. Fish included small-mouth, large-mouth, pike, walleye, pan-fish and musky. As we learned our way around the lakes we found the fishing tough, but managed to catch both types of bass, pike and bluegills. Patty raised one big musky (40+ inches) on a top water plug, but, the fish only followed to the boat as they often do. We tried for walleye one day in deep water and caught one. The most fun were the small-mouths along the rocky shore on gurglers. Several weighed over a pound and struck and fought hard on our fly rods. We also enjoyed biking, hiking the many trails and seeing the local sights including the cranberry bogs. Wisconsin produces about 65% of all our cranberries.

Weather was mixed with some rain and cool enough in the mornings (50's) for a light jacket. We also enjoyed one meal of small-mouth bass and pike. A full super-moon rise is shown on the right.

Hi Walt! Long time no see! Here comes a little greeting from Sweden!! Sending some pictures from Sweden and from some very nice fishing trips this year! It started very good with seatrout fishing in April, out at the Swedish west coast. The location is a little bit north from Gothenburg. Went out with my fly rod and caught my biggest seatrout so far weight: 5,2 kg and 77 cm and a few cast later another big one in the same spot. You can see the streamer I had in the end of the fishing line. It's called "HN-Zonker". It's not often you see that big trout in this area. Sometimes we can get fish that big in the rivers! For me it was PB in the ocean on a flyrod! (9#6). Nice!!!!

In the beginning of July I went to Norway together with some friends. We fished in a river called Glomma and it's a quit big river, located in the middle of Norway, about 4 hour drive north from Olso. It was also World Championship in fly fishing the same week we were there! Didn't know that this event was arranged in that river that week!! Very interesting to see how the professionals attack the river. They were fishing mostly from what I could see with nymphs no dry flies.

The fishing was very good on this trip, we caught may good sizes of grayling and brown trout. Few fish between 50-55 cm. We were fishing mostly with dry-flies! If anyone is interested to go to Scandinavia for fishing you are welcome to contact me! The planning for the rest of the season is to go fishing for some salmon in rivers around where I'm living!



We moved over a hump and changed to a 10 weight, tied on chartreuse tube fly for barracuda. I was rewarded with two 'cuda, a smaller one and a good 40" Great barracuda (see pics). After the 'cuda started refusing tube flies we changed over to some Surf Candies on size one hooks for Albies. Caught three small Albies and a lot load of blue runners. Not a spectacular day, but productive".

FIN NOR reels: The current FIN NOR is not the old FIN NOR from Miami that made all of those great hand made reels and therefore they do not repair any of the fly reels or big game reels made in Miami. When Zebco bought FIN NOR they did not want to upset the old customers that own the Miami reels but they did not want to take on the responsibility of repairing the old reels. They solved the problem by working a deal with the previous customer service manager David Connors who is retired in North Carolina. David would take on the repair of the old reels and open his own private business and Zebco sent him all of the parts for the old reels. His parts inventory goes all the way back to the old "Wedding Cake" series of fly reels from the 1960's. David has done a lot of work for me in the past and I was very satisfied. Well David contacted me this week and he is now fully retired and he has transferred over his reel repair business to another person. If the part is no longer available Bill can still save the day, he is a machinist and will make the part. Now of course if he has to make the part the price will be higher. # Fishing Report and Forecast "What a great time to go fishing!"

### Capt. Pat Damico, Tampa Times Captain's Corner: Advantages of fly fishing

One of the many advantages to fly fishing is when the bite is on, a lot of fish can be caught. We don't have to fool around with weights, swivels, snaps, and finicky braided line, but especially bait. Procuring live baits and keeping them healthy, the time needed to rebait and release smaller or non-targeted fish, and the chance of frequently harming them is greatly minimized. Cut bait is not always readily available. Once the proper fly is selected to "match the hatch," a single fly can last a long time, especially when constructed with synthetic materials. Since most of our flies that imitate shrimp, crabs, and baitfish have a single hook, catch and release or catch and keep is simple once the fish is on. Filing or crimping the barb will not hamper your catch rate as long as adequate pressure is kept on the fish. Many hooks are available that are barbless. Use adequate leader strength and nonabrasive tippets that are strong enough for the fish you seek. When fighting fish, keep your rod tip low and close to the water, always maintaining a soft bend. A mechanical gripping device and a dehooker similar to the ones used to quickly remove bait from a Sabiki rig minimize or eliminate the need to handle fish while keeping them in the water. When taking a picture, lift the fish horizontally from the water with wet hands and never hold it out of the water longer than you can hold your breath.

**Capt Rick Grassett reports:** I hosted a group of friends and clients on my annual destination fly fishing trip to southwest Montana recently. I traveled from Sarasota to Bozeman and met up with Kirk Grassett, from DE and made the 2-1/2 hour drive to Medicine Lodge, on a 100,000 acre working ranch near the Beaverhead River, outside of Dillon, MT. We met up there with Mike Perez and Dennis Kinley, from IN, who drove and met us at the lodge.

Despite some fishing restrictions due to heat and low water, we caught and released some quality trout. We fished the Beaverhead, Big Hole and Jefferson Rivers with guide Dave King, owner of King Outfitters (406) 596-0209 in Dillon, and his talented group of guides. I've fished with Dave for more than 20-years, his guides do a great job and know their fishery well. We fished 5 and 6-weight fly tackle and caught and released brown and rainbow trout to more than 20" on streamers, dry flies, dry/dropper and nymph rigs. The dry fly action was with a variety of dry flies, sometimes with a nymph dropper, or with a smaller dry fly and a few other bugs. Like fishing everywhere, there were good days and slower days but overall it was a great trip!




