Guest Speaker Dr. Mike Larkin

Dr. Larkin received his doctorate degree in fisheries from the University of Miami's bonefish and tarpon conservation research program. Highlights of his research include the discovery that bonefish in Florida migrate to the Bahamas, bonefish live to 21 years, and completion of the world's first bonefish stock assessment. Mike was also the first person to successfully deploy a satellite tag on tarpon. As for his talk, it will be about tarpon biology. He will talk about tarpon fossil records, vision, feeding, rolling, and movements.

Fly Casting Tip for November

One Outfit, Two Lines

I fish an eight weight rod most of the time in Tampa Bay, but also have 6, 7, and 9 weights ready to go. If you only have one rod, I suggest the 8 weight. The eight is strong enough to handle all our inshore fish, but not too heavy to fish all day. Additionally, it has enough strength to cast in the wind and to handle bigger flies. Both the 6 and 7 are fine though and will have a lighter presentation for stealth. And, the 9, of course, is a little stronger and will handle more wind and bigger flies.

For lines, I suggest a good quality floating line with a weight forward taper. Buy the best line you can afford and expect to pay \$50 to \$100. These lines last quite a while and a having a quality line is important. It's nice to have a spare line and reel and I suggest a clear sink-tip line. These are also weight forward and have about 10 feet of clear, sinking tip at the casting end. The clear tip is especially useful in winter because the fish can not spot it as easily in the clear water. And, if you are fishing a little deeper water, the tip will help get your fly down. This is a versatile line and I use one all winter.

They land a little harder, up so be aware of that. You also have to pick them up a little more carefully since the tip will always be sunk. However, just use good technique with a slow pickup until the fly begins to leave the water, then haul and snap the rod back to about one o'clock and stop. This will give you a good, high back-cast and set you up for an easy forward cast. See our casting instructor Jonas before any meeting to fine tune and learn good technique. Bacteria Alert

Retired Navy Physician, Mike Perez, sent us this heads up. "Could you pass this info to our club members? There is a warning out that local gulf waters have high counts of Vibrio vulnificus, the flesh eating bacteria. There have been over 55 confirmed cases with 5 deaths reported since Hurricane Ian. I would recommend that club members wear their waders while wading until the inshore water temperature drops into the 60's. The local Tampa waters around Gandy/Picnic Island have been very tannin stained and I know that this area has problems with septic tanks and the Vibrio bacteria being in these waters. The heavy rains from the hurricane are still being discharged from the land into our local waters."

This is from a Hillsborough website: Bacteria are everywhere, including in our surface waters. Most are harmless. Water resource managers test for the presence of certain bacteria in waterways to protect human health. Some kinds of bacteria may cause illness if people are exposed to them, and others are harmless but their presence may indicate contamination from sources that may contain harmful pathogens. The presence of bacteria can affect our ability to use surface water for drinking, swimming, and shellfish production and harvesting.



Fishing Report and Forecast "What a great time to go fishing!"

Most guides make thorough preparations before a trip with clients. Tackle, equipment, weather, tides, water levels and boat preparation in freshwater and saltwater are needed. Since most of my fishing is with a fly rod in relatively shallow water, it is especially important that I have a good idea about water height and temperature, tidal movement, when high and low tides occur, even water clarity. We have a source that gives us most of these answers. The United States Geological Survey is a science bureau in the Department of the Interior. It provides science about the natural hazards that threaten lives and livelihoods; the water, energy, minerals and other natural resources we rely on; the health of our ecosystems and environment; and the impacts of climate and land-use change. I will bookmark or do a search for potential fishing locations such as Pinellas Point or Crystal River and include the United States Geological Survey with the name.

Fortunately the Sarasota area fared well during Hurricane Ian compared to areas to our south. Others suffered catastrophic damages that may take years to recover from. Although there is still a large amount of runoff, Sarasota Bay is recovering nicely. Fly anglers fishing Sarasota Bay with me, out of CB's Saltwater Outfitters on Siesta Key, had good action catching and releasing snook, trout and several other species recently.

Snook fishing around dock lights and bridges should be a good option now. You may also find juvenile tarpon in canals and creeks and in a few places mixed with snook around dock lights. Look for reds in skinny water. Fishing deep grass flats for a variety of species is also usually a good option for action. Our natural resources are under constant pressure from red tides and other algae blooms fueled by residential, industrial and agricultural runoff, toxic spills and intentional releases, freezes, increasing fishing pressure and habitat loss and degradation, please limit your kill, don't kill your limit!



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



