

People You Meet on the Water

My wife and I met Mike from Glenwood Springs, Colorado on a mid-March fishing trip to the Frying Pan river. We were out in our second home in Ft Collins to check on things and get a little winter weather. The house was fine and the weather did not disappoint with snow in the mountains, lows in the 20's and highs in the 40's.

We decided to head west for a few days of sightseeing and fishing so we reserved a house near Carbondale for two nights, all we could get on short notice. Located on the Crystal River with ½ mile of private water we were all set. A nice rainbow trout on the first day provided dinner that night. We were also close to the Roaring Fork and Frying Pan rivers, our prime destination. These are both world class tail waters well known for crowds and big fish.

The first afternoon we stopped by the fly shop in Basalt for local knowledge and flies. We learned the Frying Pan was fishing good and the area below the dam was a great place to start. Surveying the spot a little later we discovered the road down to the dam was steep and snow-covered. Nonetheless, the next morning we arrived there and headed down the hill in our Tundra pickup and found only one car parked by the dam.

Here we met Mike, standing on snow covered rooks and fishing right where the water flowed from under the small dam. Flows were low during the winter before snow melt. Mike graciously offered to share his spot and said go ahead and jump in while he re-tied. Mike fished an indicator with two small midge flies above a split shot. Each cast he drifted them about four feet deep in the current. He knew what he was doing and we watched him catch a trout about every five minutes. These were browns and rainbows ranging from 10 to 20 inches. We could see the fish working in the current and picking off bugs under the water. Mike took a couple of pictures for us and shared his net several times. Lou and I fished a woolly bugger with a tiny nymph behind it. Not as effective as Mike's rig, but we caught six trout, both browns and rainbows. The weather was good that day with full sun, light wind and a high or about 45 degrees; really nice for winter, mountain conditions.

While summers on the Pan are very busy, winter is a great time to have the river mostly to yourself. As we drove back along the river we saw only a few stalwart anglers giving it a try. However, as a tailwater, the river fishes well throughout the winter. We had a super first visit to the Frying Pan, enriched by meeting and fishing with Mike. 
Heavy fly and the leader isn't turning over. Get out of jail? By Jonas

Now, some instances demand a big/heavy fly whether we like it or not. You know it's going to be a struggle – so, what to do?


I would consider a line with a 8' clear tip. The tip is intermediate and sinks very slowly. A big/heavy fly will pull the distal part of a floating line under anyway so the lines will be similar. The advantage of the clear tip is that now you can get away with a short leader. The distal part of your fly line is clear anyway. This line has a short head and is 0.75 sizes over-weighted, so it has the mass to deal with a big/heavy fly.

Capt. Rick Grassett's "King Outfitters/Medicine Lodge, Dillon, MT trip", July 23-29, 2023

I will be hosting a group of fly anglers in Montana again in 2023. I have been a fly fishing guide in Sarasota for more than 30-yrs, but I've also been hosting fly anglers to destinations in the Bahamas, Montana, Belize and Venezuela for more than 20-yrs. I currently do 2 trips a year; Montana and Andros, Bahamas. Most anglers are clients and have been going for years but there is occasionally availability. There are 2 spots available for Montana out of 8 (4 anglers are regulars on this trip). We are 4-months away from this trip so if you're considering, there is still time to plan flights, etc.





Fishing Report and Forecast "What a great time to go fishing!"

Fly fisherman and casting instructor Pat Damico charters Fly Guy in lower Tampa Bay and can be reached at captpatdamico.com and 727-504-8649.

Sight casting to visible fish is the most exciting way to catch larger fish with any equipment, but especially with a fly rod. If you have balanced tackle and the proper fly it must be quickly and carefully placed so the fish can see it. Wind, tidal movement, boat position and direction of the cast must always be considered. If you are executing all the essentials to make a good fly cast, how do you stop the fly at the correct spot to acheive much needed accuracy? At shorter distances, you can false cast to the side of the intended spot then deliver the cast to the target. This takes time and risks spooking your quarry especially when the sun can cause the fly line's shadow to scare the fish. As your fly approaches the correct spot, pinch the fly line with your line hand as it slides between your thumb and index finger to achieve accuracy. Some lawn practice is necessary to do this well and always pay big dividends when on the water.

This is a great month for snook on shallow flats. Reds and trout will also be more active as the water warms and baitfish become more plentiful. You might find Spanish mackerel, blues and pompano in passes or on deep grass flats. You should also find Spanish mackerel along with false albacore (little tunny), cobia and tripletail, in the coastal gulf this month. Tarpon should also make an appearance in bay or back country areas or along beaches by later in the month. Tarpon will become more plentiful as resident fish make their way out of rivers and creeks and early arriving migratory fish begin to show along beaches, particularly by the end of the month. Water temperature in the gulf is a key factor with 80 degrees being an optimum temperature. As the water warms towards that, fish will become more plentiful. Resident fish may be rolling on deep grass flats in some of the same places that you find trout, laid up on edges of shallow grass flats or along sand bars. Fly anglers might connect with a black Deceiver or Tarpon bunny fly fished on a 12-weight fly rod with a floating or clear sink tip fly line depending on depth. I always have tarpon tackle, rigged and ready, on the boat this time of year.




