FFI's New Conservation Paradigm

Fly Fishers International proposes a new vision that acknowledges conservation of fish and wildlife habitats as an important commitment to protecting our planet from the impacts of climate change. Agencies charged with managing our natural landscapes and the plant communities they represent have historically done a commendable job when given the financial and policy support necessary for success. Higher priority needs to be placed on preserving the health and function of these natural landscapes for their global value. For this reason we've released "A New Conservation." Paradigm." This proposal outlines recommendations for accomplishing this new approach. It is our hope that others, especially those involved in conservation work, will recognize the critical role these habitats play and join us in our efforts to preserve them.

Local Conservation News

I mention conservation issues in our newsletter when I get a chance. For example I will include emails from Tom Logan who chairs the Fly Fishers International Conservation Committee in Florida. FFI and their conservation committee work hard in Florida and across the U.S. on clean water issues. Much thanks to Tom for his work with FFI. Other organizations our club supports include the Tarpon and Bonefish Trust, the Florida chapter of the Coastal Conservation Association, Captains for Clean Water and Tampa Bay Waterkeepers. Thanks to all those folks for their hard work in our community and Florida. I urge you to check them out and help where you can.

Tampa Bay remains at risk for pollution and habitat loss. Our seagrass is in decline and sewage spills in the bay are too common. We are also losing mangrove shoreline as I was reminded on a recent trip out of the Gandy boat ramp. I went north and passed under the Howard Franklin to fish the south end of the Cypress flat. I was distressed to see the new I-275 bridge has taken away probably two thirds of the south mangrove shoreline. I have fished that shoreline for 20 years and am sorry to see it go in the name of progress. Equally distressing, we stopped at the flat just north of the Gandy and found that shoreline altered by a new development along S Westshore. They also added a rock jetty in the middle of the flat for some reason. That is another great flat we have fished for years looking for snook and reds. Unfortunately despite ongoing conservation efforts, we continue to chip away at the health of Tampa Bay, our most valuable resource.

Lake Calm Outing 8 July

Please join the club for this easy and fun outing on Lake Calm in Odessa. The club will provide lunch and drinks. Bring your canoe or kayak to fly fish this crystal clear lake for bass and pan fish. Any light fly rod will work with a 8 pound leader. I will bring my Ghennoe and have room for two new people to show them the ropes. We will open the gates at 6:30 AM, fish till about 11:30 AM and finish with lunch. Take the Veterans north to the Van Dyke road exit, turn left and go to Gunn Hwy. Turn right and watch for Bonnie Cove Lane on your left after about one mile. Turn left on Bonnie Cove and go straight to the property and thru the gate.



Smitty's White Widow

Smitty writes: Walt ... Here's a fly that I tied for Robert Fischer to test for me a while back ... he took one look at it and his mouth said "O.K. I'll give it a try" but his 'eyes' said "Smitty, this fly won't catch diddly". I got a call from him from on the water. "Smitty, I'll never doubt you again. I wasn't having much luck today, so I decided , what the heck, let me try Smitty's fly. I WILL NEVER DOUBT YOU AGAIN. My first three casts I caught three *HUGE* trout each one larger than the last".

This is a proven fly on Tampa Bay for Trout, Snook, and Ladyfish, as well as Tarpon and Redfish (for Redfish use a sink

tip or full sinking line to get the fly down; it is very buoyant).

Materials:

Hook: Mustad 3407 size 1 - 1/0 (or your favorite saltwater hook)

Thread: Chartreuse flat waxed nylon

Tail: White Rabbit zonker strip (Magnum)*

Flash: Micro Flashabou Body: White Body Fur**

Eyes: 8mm (5/32") molded eyes

Coating: Softex

Weedguard: Optional (your favorite style)

Tying Sequence:

Step 1: Tie in thread above hook point and wrap back to bend. Tie in a zonker strip and post with about 10 wraps of thread to stand tail up slightly. (This will help to keep from fouling.)

Step 2: Tie in pearl Flashabou. (About 2 strands doubled and splayed back on either side of the zonker.)

Step 3: Tie in the leading edge of body fur and palmer as you would a hackle feather. Stroke material back after each wrap so you don't matt it down. Tie off and cut excess body fur away.

Step 4: Back-wrap over the leading edge of body fur to make it lay back. Taper head and whip finish.

Step 5: Glue on molded eyes with FletchTite Gel. Apply color with markers to show gills and other markings if you like.

Step 6: Apply <u>thin</u> coat of Softex to the top of the fly between eyes to create a diving head (similar to Dahlberg Diver). Too heavy of a coat will deform the head of the fly when it dries.

Casting Tip: Striping Baskets

Striping baskets are useful tools to keep track of your line while fishing. I don't use one most of the time, but know several very good fly fisherman who use one all the time while wade fishing. I just don't like to fuss with one, but they are necessary under certain conditions. First, if you encounter floating grass in the water, then the baskets helps keep your line clear. Your fly line seems to attract grass, which will in turn inhibit your casting. The second case is when you are beach fishing. Both the sand and surf will wreck havoc on your ability to cast and control your line. Thus, I do own a basket and use it when necessary. You can make one on your own or buy one for not too much money. Everyone should probably have one and learn to use it. Two examples are shown below. Attached to your waist, they simply hold your line between casts.

Hazel Creek Adventure 29 Apr to 5 May

Walt Durkin and Ted Hagaman drove to Hazel Creek near Fontana Dam, North Carolina to camp and fish for five days. According to Wikipedia, "Hazel Creek is a tributary stream of the Little Tennessee River in the southwestern Great Smoky Mountains of North Carolina. The creek's bottomlands were home to several pioneer Appalachian communities and logging towns before its incorporation into the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. Hazel Creek is now a back country campsite and historical area."

The Hazel Creek area remains one of the most remote regions of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park, and is accessible only by boat and foot. The Fontana Village Marina provides ferry access (via pontoon boat) to both Eagle Creek and Hazel Creek. The ferry ride to Hazel Creek costs \$50 per person and takes about 20 minutes. From there, you hike 5 to 10 miles along a forest service road to several designated camp sites. Pack hanging cables are needed as the creek area is frequented by black bears.

Hazel creek is considered the best trout stream in the Smokey Mountains and holds good numbers of wild brook, brown and rainbow trout. I found it tricky to fish with some high banks and fast water and averaged one trout per day. Ted with more experience on the creek averaged five trout per day on dry flies and nymphs. Good hatches appeared each day and dry fly fishing was usually best in the afternoon. We caught mostly rainbow trout from 6 to 10 inches and 1 brown trout. The brook trout live further up Hazel Creek near the headwater and in tributaries. Ted fished high up on one day, but did not have much luck. However, Hazel Creek holds big rainbow and brown trout and unfortunately we were unable to catch a trophy size fish on the trip.

With our packs coming in at about 45 pounds we decided to use beach carts to haul our gear. The hike in is not too long, but uphill as you gain a couple of thousand feet. Our little carts worked just fine and we got there with energy to spare in 2 ½ hours. Ted prepared all our camp food and we ate well for six days and five nights. Country ham and pancakes highlighted two mornings and two trout dinners were spectacular. Mornings were cold, in the high thirties, but warmed quickly after 10 AM and sunshine. We caught pretty nice weather with only a little rain on our second day. Camp fires were best in the morning to warm up and we turned in early after fishing and hiking all day. We filtered clear water from the stream and found a couple of springs coming out of the mountain you could just drink from. Two campers reported seeing bears the night before we arrived, but we did not find any. We stayed at the Hike Inn on our first and last nights. The rooms are small, but very comfortable with good, hot showers. The drive is 650 miles and takes between 11 and 12 hours.

Hazel Creek is really a treasure, isolated, remote, open to anyone willing and able to make an effort. Camping was hard on my old bones, but well worth it. Many thanks to my great friend Ted for guiding me on this unique experience and I hope to return again.




Club members Robert, Ted and Jim fished Trout


Gasparilla Island Snook

My wife and I traveled to Gasparilla Island to spend the week with Ted and Kathy Hagaman in mid-May. They have been going there for 30 years and we have joined them in recent years. We rent a two-bedroom condo (Sea Oaks) on the beach to relax and fish for the week. The condo is located about a mile from Gasparilla Pass and the beach usually provides good snook fishing. This year the snook were just starting to come out on the beach and the fishing was slow. The few snook we saw were small males and very spooky in the clear water. However, we had a good a outgoing hill tide in the pass and fished there among the docks after dark. The hill tide flushed out many shrimp each night and the snook eagerly chased them. We had good luck with shrimp flies and caught multiple snook each night until the tide died. We also lost several big fish as they went for the dock and snapped 30 pound test leaders. Loads of fun and very exciting fishing at night. As luck would have it, Ted stayed another week with his family and reported catching three nice snook on the beach the morning after we left. A couple of the big fish we managed to land pictured below along with the shrimp fly, tied with craft fur, Kwan style, in light tan.



Fishing Report and Forecast "What a great time to go fishing!"

Fly fisherman and casting instructor Pat Damico charters Fly Guy in lower Tampa Bay and can be reached at captpatdamico.com and 727-504-8649.

Getting a trout, redfish and snook on the same outing with a fly rod is very challenging. Increase your chances by concentrating on lighted docks and bridges. We often go out a few hours before daylight and can usually fish without seeing another boat, especially on weekdays. Trout and snook have been the primary targets; reds can be very regional and docks near flats that hold reds during the day are always preferred. The tide must be moving to produce feeding frenzies that often allow doubles when two fly casters are working carefully covering an area. Position one caster on each end of the boat. Rather than anchor, a bow mounted electric trolling motor will keep your boat in the proper position parallel to the shoreline. Use it to get large fish away from barnacle encrusted pilings that ruin fly lines and break off fish. Baby tarpon have been a recent bonus and will require a quick accurate cast as they usually do not hang around like other species. Use a 30 pound shock tippet and white baitfish patterns that match the size of bait around the lights. Crimp all barbs to make releasing easier. Respect the dock owner's privacy or you will find the light out on your next trip.

Capt Rick Grassett reports: Look for reds and snook in skinny water. Deep grass flats are usually a good option for action with trout, blues, pompano, Spanish mackerel and more. Snook fishing around dock lights and bridges should also be a good option now. Our natural resources are under constant pressure from red tides and other algae blooms fueled by residential, industrial and agricultural runoff, toxic spills and intentional releases, freezes, increasing fishing pressure and habitat loss and degradation, please limit your kill, don't kill your limit!






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
