It is probably the most successful fly in the history of fly fishing. And the name of that fly is a tribute to its creator, Bob Clouser, our special guest.

A 2023 article in "Angler's Journal" about the Clouser was headlined 'One Fly To Rule Them All'. Bonefish and bass (smallmouth especially!) love it. Billfish have chased it. Freshwater trout, too. And to that you can probably add 100 more species. His good friend Lefty Kreh wrote that he caught 80-plus different kinds of fish on the Clouser.

Bob Clouser got hooked on fly tying and fly fishing way back in his high school years. Heck, it was the subject of his senior year graduation project. And in those succeeding years fly fishing, fly tying, and fly fishing friends have remained his true loves. He has guided fly fishers, written books, started a fly casting and fly tying school, and traveled around the world to tell his story and to demonstrate his Clouser fly tying secrets to thousands.




Fly Casting Tips for March The Roll Cast

Let's talk about the importance of the roll cast as we move through Mel Krieger's book *The Essence of Fly Casting*. When Mel visited our club many years ago I remember him mentioning the roll cast was the first cast any beginner should learn. A good roll cast is an essential and versatile tool in our casting repertoire.




Mel notes the roll cast is best done on water because you need some resistance on the front end of the line. Find a lake, pond, river or beach where you can practice with 25 or 30 feet of line. To start, place the leader and a few yards of line in the water in front of you. Strip line off the reel while shaking the rod tip to feed more slack line in front of you. Once you have sufficient line out, hold the line coming off the reel against the rod with a finger of your casting hand. Securing the line in this manner anchors the fly line while you cast. Do not hold the fly line with your left hand during this practice. Mel notes this will ensure you have no slack in the fly line between the left hand and fly rod. You are now set to begin practice.

I suggest you take this basic tip and spend some time on improving and perfecting your roll cast. Go to the internet or Mel's book to study and learn the mechanics of the cast. Then, start practicing as recommended in this tip. Perfecting this simple, but often-used cast will improve all your casting strokes and provide a valuable tool on the water. //Walt

I then fished with my buddy Capt. Honson Lau up at Chaz trying to target a big snook on fly but ended up with a bycatch redfish that taped out at 35.5 inches.





Fishing Report and Forecast "What a great time to go fishing!"

Some first-time guided trips are more successful than others because of unclear expectations by both the client and the guide. Discussions of the day's activities and results by each group can be very revealing. When guides get together they want to know about the trip, and customers do likewise. I can't think of guides that frequently haven't been clients themselves on many occasions. When guides have a free fishing day, they often get together with another guide to exchange information. It is all part of a continuous learning experience. This may be more common in fly fishing because of increased interest by younger clients, people changing from offshore to inshore, freshwater to saltwater, and bait and spinning to the long rod. At a trout fly club event while in Pennsylvania I sat with 5 freshwater trout fishers who all said their dream was to catch a large tarpon on a fly rod. This means they would be using much heavier equipment from a moving boat, frequently casting in very windy conditions to a moving gigantic fish that will surely make their knees knock. Should both the guide and the client be prepared for serious disappointment?

Fishing Report

Snook should be staging on flats, around sand and oyster bars, on points of islands and around docks and bridges close to passes in the ICW. Fish the edges of bars and potholes when the tide is low and mangrove shorelines or points of islands when the tide is high. I like wide profile flies, such as Lefty's Deceiver, my Grassett Flats Bunny or EP flies, for snook on the flats

You'll also find snook around docks and bridges in the ICW. Night snook fishing should be productive with small white flies, like my Grassett Snook Minnow fly, shrimp patterns or Shrimp Gurglers. Fish peak tidal flows for the best action.

Reds will spend more time feeding on shallow flats due to more plentiful bait. Look for them in potholes, the edges of bars and around docks when the tide is low. You should find them higher on flats over shallow grass or around mangrove shorelines when the tide is high. My Grassett Flats Minnow is my "go to" fly for reds. It fishes well in shallow water and its bend back design makes it very weedless. You may also find big trout in skinny water in many of the same places that you find reds. The same flies and techniques used to find and catch reds will also work for big trout.






