June Meeting Photos



Little Gasparilla Island

We traveled to Boca Grande on Little Gasparilla Island for a week in early June for our annual trip with Ted and Kathy Hagaman. As usual we relaxed, walked the beach, watched sunsets, found shark's teeth and, of course, fished for snook on the beach. The weather conspired against us when a low pressure system settled in with west and southwest winds and rain. This resulted in poor conditions to sight fish the beach, so we resorted to spin fishing to save the week. We caught snook almost every day and had one good day on the fly, when the weather calmed down on Thursday. We fished Puglisi Minnows and found the snook around the floating grass brought in by the rough waves. Z-Man plastic minnows did the job on spinning tackle.



Fly Casting Tips for March

The Basic Cast

I have been creating casting tips based on Mel Krieger's book: *The Essence of Fly Casting*. I recently bought Joe Humphrey's book *On The Trout Stream* where he describes his fishing and casting styles. He was a contemporary of Mel's and is still with us at 96 years young. Maybe fishing does keep us going? Joe's casting style is similar to Mel's and here is how he describes the dry fly cast.



This will be a trout fishing tip with the goal of getting a good drift on your fly using a slack line cast. To begin, start with a normal cast, that is, start slowly and lift your line off the water until the fly begins to move. Then, snap your wrist back and stop the rod tip at about the one o'clock position. Hesitate, and then make the forward stroke and stop suddenly at the 11 o'clock position. Now, Joe recommends squeezing the thumb forward with downward pressure to lower the tip slightly. "This takes the line over the rod tip and prevents a tailing loop. Rod unloads forward and throws the line forward in a vertical plane." If you stopped here you make a normal straight cast with line and leader.

To get a slack leader Joe talks about changing levels. As the cast continues he changes two levels by dropping the elbow and the rod tip. This takes energy out of the forward cast and results in a slack or loosely coiled leader you want for a drag free drift.

Sometimes beginners get this slack line when they don't want to by not stopping the rod soon enough or dropping the rod tip when they really don't want to. It is a good cast for the dry fly, but should be avoided for salt water fly fishing. Regardless, it is useful to understand the concept and why your line goes out straight or in coils. I hope this helps and if not look up one of Joe's videos and watch the master himself at work. //Walt

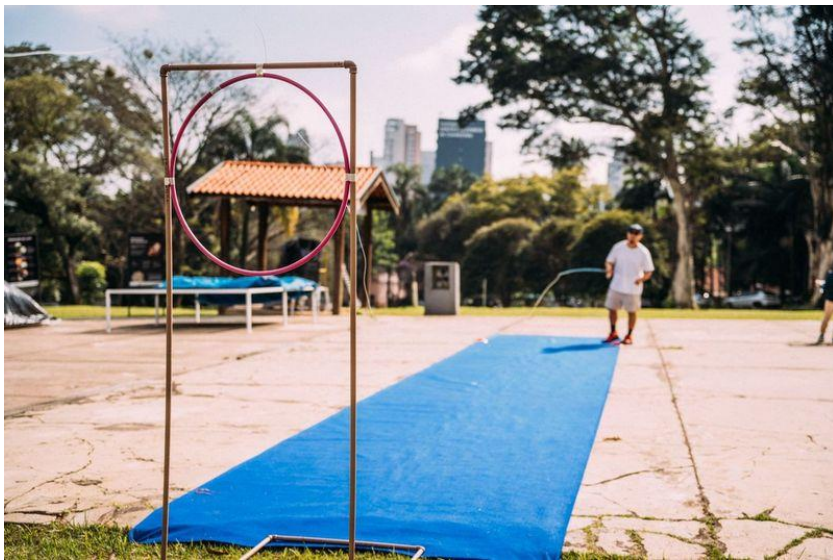

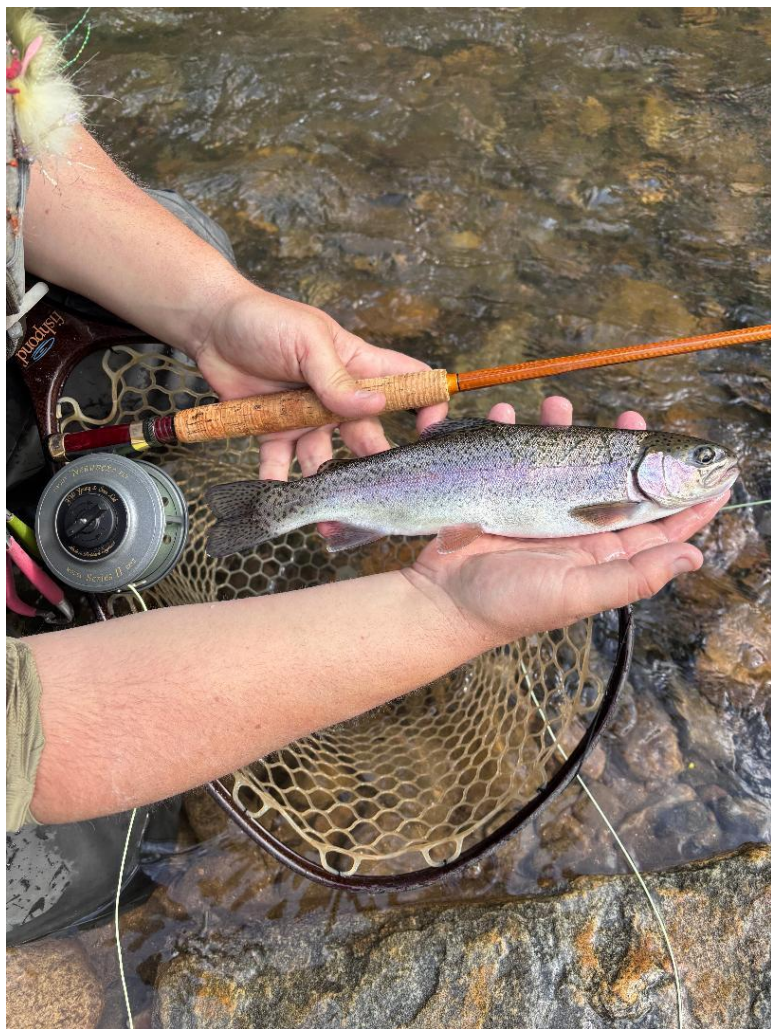
Wes and Kelly Sobczak have moved to South Carolina about 30 minutes from the Chattanooga River. The Chattanooga is known for its trout fishing in the fall/winter/spring months, but in the summer, the Bartram's bass become the target species. Bartram's bass are only found in two watersheds and have a distinctive turquoise slash above red eyes. Wes and Kelly participated in Bart's Day on June 21 - a free, fun tournament targeting the Bartram's bass. While they didn't win, it was a fun day ending at Humble Pie, a local pizza hangout that is a favorite of former **TBFFC members Nannette and Rick O'Hara**. They also fished the Eastatoe River for rainbow trout and Wes caught the brook trout shown below center.



From Jim Dye: "This is a nice brown trout from mine and Robert's trip to the White River outside Cotter, Arkansas. We had 2 days on the White and a 3rd day on Crooked Creek for smallmouth. Day 1 on White was special. Vigorous hatch of Sulphur's got trout in the mood. There seemed to be trout rising all over the river. Almost all rainbows. Great Day. Day 2 was bluebird weather and we expected more of the same. The hatch never got underway for reasons known only to the mayflies. And they refused to talk. We switched to streamers and got fish that way. A couple were nice. On day 3, Robert suggested smallmouth fishing. We floated the quiet creek. Not crowded at all. The smallest were there throughout the day. This creek was more peaceful than White and it was a nice change of pace. It was a nice trip. Allegiant flies direct from St. Pete to Springfield, Mo. Cotter is about 2 hours from there."



Club member Jeff Abeles reports: “Last week I fished some private water up in the Ashville area using my 1930's Heddon Bamboo fly rod. Somehow we found a Cicada hatch and had 3 hours of incredible dry fly fishing.”



Capt. Bryon Chamberlin sent is this: "I got to fish with my buddy Capt. Billy Rotne over in the New Symerna area for big bull redfish on surface flies. We fished around the Ponce Inlet area, and waited on the outgoing tide for the crab flush to start. I briefly stung a large redfish that was probably close to 45" in length. Shortly afterwards, I caught one that measured out to 40". Then Billy was up to bat and quickly caught one that measured 45" and was probably pushing close to 40lbs. Windless Days

Beautiful, sunny, windless days may be great for many things, but fly fishing isn't one of them unless you make some adjustments. Clear water, especially in the gulf, has presented many issues when sight casting. Snook are still around and share their water close to shore with baby tarpon. If we can easily see fish at a distance, how do we appear to them? Not using a flats boat is a good start. Use your boat to get to fish that are undisturbed, then wade if the bottom is suitable. It is even better to stay on land away from the water when fish are close to shore. Avoid a shadow or flash from the sun on your equipment. Leave brightly colored clothes at home. Blend in with the water or sky. Minimize what you carry. Metal fly boxes, hemostats, clippers, reflective sunglasses, even light-colored skin can be covered to allow a closer approach as well as sun protection. Wear a neutral-colored wide brim hat with a dark underside to improve vision with good polarized sunglasses. A good pair of fly fishing gloves should also have a thicker area to prevent cut fingers from frequent stripping of the fly line while working a fly. The new distance fly lines that have a rough texture cut skin easily. Long thinner tapered leaders, often 12-15 feet, will keep the thicker fly line away from the fish. Cast accurately and allow the smaller fly to land on the water softly, well ahead of a moving fish. Very long casts are necessary; practice them with an absolute minimum of false casting.

Fishing Report

Tarpon will still be a good option this month. Catch and release night snook fishing in the ICW or in the surf should also be good options. With water temperatures pushing 90 degrees, shallow water action for reds and big trout will be best early in the day.

Tarpon fishing should be good in the coastal gulf in July, which is my favorite month to fly fish for tarpon. Large schools of tarpon will dwindle in size and numbers to singles, doubles and small schools of mostly post spawn fish.

Reds should be very active in shallow water this month. With plentiful baitfish and higher tides, they should spend more time feeding over shallow grass flats. Look for them along the edges of bars or in potholes when the tide is low or along mangrove shorelines and around oyster bars when the tide is high. You'll also find big trout in many of the same areas where you find reds, but the bite for big trout is usually best early or late in the day. I tie my Grassett Flats Minnow in a larger size this time of year to match the size and profile of pilchards or pinfish that are plentiful. Fly poppers and Gurglers may draw some big explosions! In my opinion it's important to protect larger trout, which are usually female breeders.

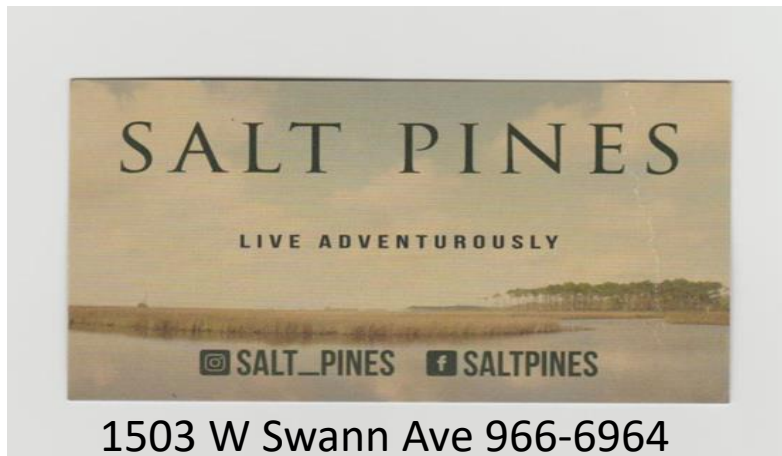

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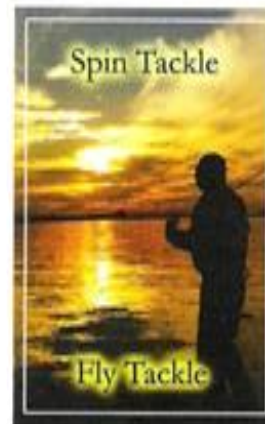

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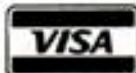
