

Fly FishingTip for August

This month's tip is about the importance of tying a knot quickly and correctly. When you hook a fish your leader is always the weakest point in the system, thus, poorly tied knots often result in lost fish. You will find many knots listed online, but here are the ones I use most often.

- Clinch knot: used to tie your fly to your leader. This is an important knot you will tie all the time. Make sure to use enough turns and use the "improved" version to ensure the knot won't slip.
- Blood knot: used to build a leader or add tippet. This knot is a little tricky, so take time to practice
 it at home.
- Surgeon's knot: also used to build a leader or add tippet. Not as elegant as a blood knot, but serviceable. Often used for lighter tippets while trout fishing.
- Uni knot: used to tie your fly to the leader. This is a simple knot that will leave a small loop, which is useful.
- Non-slip knot: sometimes called the Lefty non-slip knot. This knot is useful for saltwater fishing when you want a small loop for shrimp, crab and minnow flies. The loop will give the flies more movement.
- Perfection knot: This is also a non-slip knot and often used to secure your leader to your fly line; loop to loop.

Okay, so look these knots up online for tying instructions. They are all pretty simple and easy to tie with a little practice. Tying a secure knot quickly is an important skill for all anglers. //Walt

Matt Santilli sent us this great report: "Fish have been tough to find on the flats in the bay. The best luck for reds have been on mud flats on the west side of the bay at near 0 evening low tides. Kev and I found plenty this past month crawling, catching 3 total and one snook, but as the month went on, this action slowed down. Grassy flats bordering the Gulf are more lively with plenty of trout hanging at the edge of drop offs and in inlets. Reds can be found following schools of large mullet or on the edges of mangrove islands and prefer flashier, faster baits in the early morning. Sheepshead have also been schooling around docks and edges of flats, but have been hard to present anything to due to their spooky nature. Pompano have been running inlets and beaches but pass through in spaced out waves, you can load up on some in a few minutes then not see any for a couple of hours."



Ted and Walt's Trip to Kelly Creek, ID Mid-August 2025

Here is Ted's Part 1 of a 2 part story on our trip to Kelly Creek, ID to fish for wild, west-slope cutthroat trout. Part 1 covers our preparation for the two-week trip and Part 2 will recount our fishing adventures.

Ted writes: "For a long time I have wanted to do a camping trip out west to fish for wild west-slope cutthroat trout in a remote area. My research led me to the North Fork of the Clearwater River and its tributary Kelly Creek in northern Idaho's Clearwater National Forest. Most of central and northern Idaho is National Forest Land only accessed by a few dirt roads. The North Fork and Kelly Creek drainage are the home of west-slope cutthroat trout and bull trout. To protect this fishery the state of Idaho designated these rivers catch and release, barbless hook only in 1970. Under this protection for 55 years the wild populations have thrived and the rivers are full of cutthroat trout willing to rise to your dry fly offering. The higher stretches of these rivers also harbor bull trout, a predator char which requires cold clean water for its survival. Their presence is an indication of excellent stream health. They are endangered and protected in their last strongholds of Montana, Idaho, and two Canadian provinces.

I ran my idea past my friend and fishing buddy Walt who has a home in Ft Collins Colorado and he liked the idea. He had been considering doing some camping in Colorado to access some of the remote streams that were too far from home for a day trip. I suggested a truck camping trip to Idaho would be a great excuse to buy the gear to do some camping with his wife. He was all in on the plan.

I did some research on the type of tent and sleeping arrangements that would be best for "glamping" with his wife and would also work for our trip. I sent my recommendations to Walt and he purchased the necessary equipment. I had the cooking, water treatment, meal planning and tent camping experience that would be helpful to Walt on his future glamping excursions with his wife.

The peak cutthroat fishing in our planned part of Idaho is from July 15 to August 15. In January 2025 we set the dates for our trip for August 7-20 and I purchased my airline ticket to meet Walt in Ft Collins."

We camped at Kelly Forks Campground and fished for 9 days in Kelly Creek and the N Fork of the Clearwater. Here we found beautiful cutthroat trout in crystal clear water willing to rise to our dry flies. The weather was good with no rain, sunny days and cool nights and mornings. My Tacoma was packed full with gear, and we were very comfortable with a good tent, cots, bathrooms and a close-by water source. Morning fires with coffee and evening fires with cold beer worked just fine. We saw eagles and humming birds and one bear was sighted. More to come in Part 2 with tales of our adventures fishing this wild and pristine place.









We fished high in the Rockies at Poudre Creek below Longdraw Reservoir. The creeks were running high, but we still caught beautiful brook trout. They will soon add Greenback Cutthroats to these pristine creeks. Patty, Bruce, Walt and Lou are shown fishing.



Fishing Report and Forecast "What a great time to go fishing!"

Fly Fishing in the Wind

I have seen some members of our local fly-fishing clubs on the water using spin tackle because they felt it was too windy to use their fly rods. However, you will occasionally see someone fly fishing in the wind, and they seem to be very comfortable. If you plan a distant fishing trip, days without wind may be very scarce. Several things will help. Keep your loops very tight. Cast very close to the water, holding the fly rod horizontal instead of vertical. This gives the wind less time to destroy your cast. Keep your rod, fly line, and fly on the downwind side of you in a crosswind. Using a longer rod keeps everything away from you, including your fly's hook point. Use smaller flies that are lightly dressed. Shorten your leader and make it heavier and stiffer than usual. A chop on the water allows you to get much closer to fish, making shorter casts the norm. Avoid fishing in open water; find areas where there is protection from the wind. Islands, trees, buildings, and bridges can be used to your advantage. This is a good time to fish narrow creeks and channels.

Fishing Report

You should find snook this month around docks and bridges close to passes, in the ICW and in the surf. They will also start making their move towards shallow flats where you might find them staging along sand bars or in potholes. Fly poppers or Gurglers may draw some big strikes in shallow water at night or early in the day! I often fish lighted docks and bridges for snook before dawn before moving to the flats after daylight. My Grassett Snook Minnow fly is my 'go to' fly pattern for snook in the dark.

Reds are usually in large schools in September. You may find them in shallow water when the tide is high or along the edges of flats when the tide is low. Look for wakes, some as big as boat wakes, or "pushes" to locate them. If it is calm, a school of reds may look like a nervous patch of water or if there's a ripple on the surface, the school may appear as a slick patch of water. Once you've located them, try to get in front of them and work around the edges of the school to avoid spooking the whole school. Fly anglers should score with fly poppers, Gurglers and wide profile baitfish fly patterns. I like to be as quiet as possible in shallow water, using a push pole to move my boat. It is great to find a big school of reds but remember, if you spook one fish you may spook the whole school. I sometimes also find big jacks and blues mixed with schools of big reds in shallow water. Not a bad problem!



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
