As you may or may not know, I'm an avid fly fisherman here in the beautiful city of St. Petersburg, Florida. I'm passionate about sharing my love for fly fishing with children, especially those who may not have access to such opportunities. This mentorship has been incredibly rewarding for me, allowing me to help kids enjoy our amazing waters and resources.

The Mayfly Project is a Nationwide non profit that Mentors Children in Foster Care with Fly Fishing. Every spring, for 5 Saturdays our chapter mentors anywhere from 6 to 10 kids with fly fishing. We strive to have a 1 on 1 approach to mentorship so there is consistency in our outings.

## Fly Fishing Tip for January

I often encourage folks to find a favorite flat and make it their own. Learning the terrain on a flat is interesting and will increase your chances for success. Moreover, you will notice subtle change in the flat's environment over time.

For example, this year at Cypress the fish are tailing a little further out in deeper water on the flat. This is a small change, but something I noted on the lowest tide. I suspect that is where they are finding food this year, in that deeper grass. Tailing fish are always welcome as you know they are feeding. We also saw dolphin feeding and cruising in the deeper water. They will often push reds closer in as the reds seek shallow water for safety. Surprisingly, you can still get these fish to eat. If you do get one with dolphins present, be sure to not release the fish right away because the dolphin will get them every time.

As well as studying and learning the habits of the flat, I suggest you also keep a written diary. Keep notes of each trip whether you catch fish or not. Note time, weather, tide and any other new or interesting details. Presence of bait or other life on the flat is good information. Of course, record all your catches along with flies and tactics. Try also to note how the fish react to your flies and other behavior. For example, were they spooky or receptive? Traveling in schools or singles and doubles?

Having a record of these details will help you on future trips and will also capture great memories. We love to fish the low, winter tides, which only last four months. So, in the doldrums of summer you can look back on your winter fishing and dream of the winter to come.

All the best, and I will look for you on the water. Please come over to say hello and share tips. //Walt

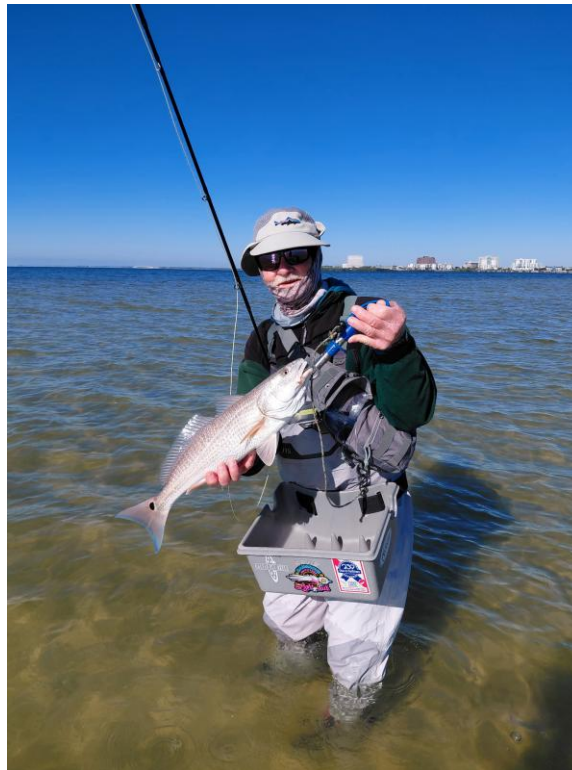

School after school of bonefish swam by all morning. As soon as you unhooked a fish and looked up, another school was in casting distance. Lots of sharks chased our fish during the week, but we never lost any to sharks. Doctor flies weren't bad. Hope everyone in the club has a Merry Christmas!"

# **Fishing Report and Forecast**

## **“What a great time to go fishing!”**

### **Clear Water**

Beautiful, sunny, windless days may be great for many things, but fly fishing isn't one of them unless you make some adjustments. Clear water, especially in the gulf, has presented many issues when sight casting. Snook are still around and share their water close to shore with baby tarpon. If we can easily see fish at a distance, how do we appear to them? Not using a flats boat is a good start. Use your boat to get to fish that are undisturbed, then wade if the bottom is suitable. It is even better to stay on land away from the water when fish are close to shore. Avoid a shadow or flash from the sun on your equipment. Leave brightly colored clothes at home. Blend in with the water or sky. Minimize what you carry. Metal fly boxes, hemostats, clippers, reflective sunglasses, even light-colored skin can be covered to allow a closer approach as well as sun protection. Wear a neutral-colored wide brim hat with a dark underside to improve vision with good polarized sunglasses. A good pair of fly fishing gloves should also have a thicker area to prevent cut fingers from frequent stripping of the fly line while working a fly. The new distance fly lines that have a rough texture cut skin easily. Long thinner tapered leaders, often 12-15 feet, will keep the thicker fly line away from the fish. Cast accurately and allow the smaller fly to land on the water softly, well ahead of a moving fish. Very long casts are necessary; practice them with an absolute minimum of false casting.
